Writing

First Grade Common Core Math Standards: Laying the Groundwork for Numeracy

Math in first grade is all about building a strong conceptual understanding of numbers, operations, and basic geometry.

Operations and Algebraic Thinking

This is where students learn the core concepts of addition and subtraction. * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.OA.A.1: Use addition and subtraction within 20 to solve word problems involving situations of adding to, taking from, putting together, taking apart, and comparing, with unknowns in all positions, e.g., by using objects, drawings, and equations with a symbol for the unknown number.** * **What it means:** First graders learn to solve real-world math problems using addition and subtraction up to 20. They learn to represent these problems with objects, drawings, and equations. * **Checklist points:** * Can they solve addition word problems up to 20 (e.g., "If there are 5 apples and 3 more are added, how many apples are there?")? * Can they solve subtraction word problems up to 20 (e.g., "If there are 10 birds and 4 fly away, how many are left?")? * Can they use drawings or manipulatives to show their thinking? * Can they write a simple equation to represent the problem (e.g., $5 + 3 = 8$)? * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.OA.A.2: Solve word problems that require adding three whole numbers, each less than or equal to 20, for example, by using objects, drawings, and equations with a symbol for the unknown number.** * **What it means:** Adding three numbers together in word problems. * **Checklist points:** * Can they solve problems involving the sum of three numbers up to 20? * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.OA.B.3: Apply properties of operations as strategies to add and subtract.** * **What it means:** Understanding that the order of numbers in addition doesn't matter (commutative property) and how to use this to their advantage. They also begin to understand the associative property. * **Checklist points:** * Do they understand that $3 + 5$ is the same as $5 + 3$? * Are they beginning to use strategies like "making ten" to solve problems (e.g., to solve $7 + 5$, they might think $7 + 3 = 10$, and $10 + 2 = 12$)? * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.OA.B.4: Understand subtraction as finding an unknown addend, for example, by using drawings and equations with a symbol for the unknown number.** * **What it means:** Seeing subtraction as the inverse of addition. * **Checklist points:** * Can they solve $8 - 3$ by thinking of the addition fact $3 + ? = 8$? * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.OA.C.5: Relate counting to addition and subtraction (e.g., by counting on 2 to add 2).** * **What it means:** Using counting as a strategy for addition and subtraction. * **Checklist points:** * Can they add by counting forward (e.g., to add 3 to 7, they count 8, 9, 10)? * Can they subtract by counting backward? * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.OA.C.6: Add and subtract within 20, demonstrating fluency for addition and subtraction within 10.** * **What it means:** Students should be able to quickly recall addition and subtraction facts within 10. They should also be able to solve problems up to 20 with strategies. * **Checklist points:** * Can they quickly recall addition facts within 10 (e.g., $4 + 5 = 9$)? * Can they quickly recall subtraction facts within 10 (e.g., $9 - 4 = 5$)? * Can they solve addition and subtraction problems up to 20 using strategies? * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.OA.D.7: Understand that in adding or subtracting two-digit numbers, the digits in each place value represent quantities corresponding to that place value.** * **What it means:** Beginning to understand place value as it relates to operations. * **Checklist points:** * Do they understand that the '2' in 20 represents two tens? * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.OA.D.8: Determine the unknown whole number in an addition or subtraction equation.** * **What it means:** Finding the missing number in an equation. * **Checklist points:** * Can they solve equations like $? + 4 = 7$ or $9 - ? = 3$?

Number and Operations in Base Ten

This is about understanding how numbers are structured. * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.NBT.A.1: Count to 120, starting at any number less than 120. Read and write numerals to 100.** * **What it means:** Mastering counting, reading, and writing numbers up to 100. * **Checklist points:** * Can they count to 120 by ones, tens, and maybe even fives? * Can they read and write numbers from 0 to 100? * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.NBT.B.2: Understand that the two digits of a two-digit number represent amounts in tens and ones. Understand the following as special cases:** * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.NBT.B.2a: 10 can be thought of as a bundle of ten ones — called a "ten."** * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.NBT.B.2b: The numbers from 11 to 19 are composed of a ten and one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, or nine ones.** * **CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.NBT.B.2c: The multiples of 10 are actually**

composed of tens and no ones. * **What it means:** Deeply understanding place value. They should see numbers like 34 as 3 tens and 4 ones. * **Checklist points:** * Can they represent a number like 25 as two tens and five ones? * Can they explain that 17 is one ten and seven ones? * Can they identify numbers that are multiples of 10 (10, 20, 30, etc.)? *

CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.NBT.B.3: Compare two two-digit numbers based on meanings of the digits in each place value, using symbols $>$, $=$, and $<$ and the words "is greater than," "is equal to," and "is less than." *

What it means: Comparing numbers using greater than, less than, or equal to. * **Checklist points:** * Can they tell which number is larger: 34 or 43? * Can they use the symbols $>$, $<$, and $=$ correctly? *

CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.1.NBT.C.4: Add within 100, including adding a two-digit number and a one-digit number, and adding two two-digit numbers, using strategies based on place value and properties of operations. Drawings and equations with a symbol for the unknown number are not required. * **What it means:** Adding two-digit numbers. * **Checklist points:** * Can they add a two-digit number and a one-digit number (e.g., $23 + 5$)? * Can they add two two-digit numbers (e.g., $34 + 21$)? * Are they using strategies like adding the tens and then the ones? *
