denotation (literal meaning) but also the connotation (emotional association) of words. For example, "stubborn" and "determined" might seem similar, but their connotations differ significantly.

6. Etymology and Word Roots

As mentioned earlier, understanding word origins can be a powerful tool. When you encounter a new word, break it down into its roots, prefixes, and suffixes. This can often provide clues to its meaning and help you remember it.

The Role of Vocabulary in Other SAT Sections

While the Reading Test is the most obvious beneficiary of a strong vocabulary, its impact extends to other sections as well:

1. **Writing and Language Test:** Understanding precise word choice, tone, and the connotations of words is crucial for improving sentences and passages. Identifying misused words or inappropriate phrasing relies heavily on vocabulary knowledge.
2. **Essay (if applicable):** A sophisticated vocabulary allows you to express complex ideas more effectively and precisely, enriching your arguments and demonstrating a higher level of linguistic proficiency.
