These mathematical disciplines provide the conceptual framework and computational tools necessary to extract meaningful insights from the deluge of information, to model increasingly complex phenomena, and to drive innovation in virtually every scientific and technological frontier. From the subtle interactions of subatomic particles to the sprawling networks of global commerce, the language of vectors and matrices offers a profound and powerful lens through which to understand and shape our world.
