4. **Savoir (to know information/how to):**

1. Present: je sais, tu sais, il/elle/on sait, nous savons, vous savez, ils/elles savent
2. Imparfait: je savais, tu savais, il/elle/on savait, nous savions, vous saviez, ils/elles savaient
3. Futur Simple: je saurai, tu sauras, il/elle/on saura, nous saurons, vous saurez, ils/elles sauront

5. **Venir (to come):**

1. Present: je viens, tu viens, il/elle/on vient, nous venons, vous venez, ils/elles viennent
2. Imparfait: je venais, tu venais, il/elle/on venait, nous venions, vous veniez, ils/elles venaient
3. Futur Simple: je viendrai, tu viendras, il/elle/on viendra, nous viendrons, vous viendrez, ils/elles viendront

6. **Dire (to say/tell):**

1. Present: je dis, tu dis, il/elle/on dit, nous disons, vous dites, ils/elles disent
2. Imparfait: je disais, tu disais, il/elle/on disait, nous disions, vous disiez, ils/elles disaient
3. Futur Simple: je dirai, tu diras, il/elle/on dira, nous dirons, vous direz, ils/elles diront

7. **Voir (to see):**

1. Present: je vois, tu vois, il/elle/on voit, nous voyons, vous voyez, ils/elles voient
2. Imparfait: je voyais, tu voyais, il/elle/on voyait, nous voyions, vous voyiez, ils/elles voyaient
3. Futur Simple: je verrai, tu verras, il/elle/on verra, nous verrons, vous verrez, ils/elles verront

8. **Devoir (to have to/must):**

1. Present: je dois, tu dois, il/elle/on doit, nous devons, vous devez, ils/elles doivent
2. Imparfait: je devais, tu devais, il/elle/on devait, nous devions, vous deviez, ils/elles devaient
3. Futur Simple: je devrai, tu devras, il/elle/on devra, nous devrons, vous devrez, ils/elles devront

Irregular -ir Verbs: A Treacherous Group

As mentioned, the -ir ending is home to some of the most frequently used and highly irregular verbs. These don't follow the regular -ir pattern (e.g., *finir*). Instead, they often have unique stems and a different set of endings.

1. **Venir (to come)** and its derivatives (*revenir* - to come back, *devenir* - to become) are prime examples.
2. **Tenir (to hold)** and its derivatives (*maintenir* - to maintain, *obtenir* - to obtain) also fall into this category.

3. **Partir (to leave)**
4. **Sortir (to go out)**
5. **Dormir (to sleep)**
6. **Courir (to run)**

These verbs often have a "u" or "i" in their stem for certain forms, making them distinct from the regular -ir verbs.

Irregular -re Verbs: Common but Tricky

Many common verbs ending in -re are irregular. These include:

1. **Prendre (to take)** and its derivatives (*apprendre* - to learn, *comprendre* - to understand).
2. **Mettre (to put/place)** and its derivatives (*permettre* - to permit, *soumettre* - to submit).
3. **Vivre (to live)**
4. **Croire (to believe)**
5. **Lire (to read)**
6. **Écrire (to write)**

The conjugation of these verbs often involves significant stem changes and unique endings.
