2. **Exposure:** Place the screen with the design in your exposure unit. The exposure time will vary depending on the type of emulsion, the light source, and its intensity. It's crucial to do test strips to determine the optimal exposure time. Too little exposure will result in a stencil that washes out too easily; too much will make it impossible to wash out.

Step 4: Developing the Stencil (Washout)

This is where your design emerges.

1. **Rinse the Screen:** After exposure, take the screen to your washout booth or a suitable area. Gently spray the screen with water. The unexposed emulsion (the area where your design was) will wash away, leaving the hardened emulsion as a barrier.
2. **Inspect:** Carefully inspect the screen for any pinholes or areas where the emulsion didn't wash out properly. Small

pinholes can often be blocked with emulsion or tape.

Step 5: Printing!

1. **Secure the Screen:** Place your screen on your printing surface or in your press.
2. **Flood the Screen:** Apply a line of ink across the top edge of your design area on the screen. Using your squeegee, gently pull the ink across the design without applying pressure – this is called "flooding" the screen and ensures the ink covers the open areas of the stencil.
3. **Print Stroke:** With firm, even pressure, pull the squeegee across the design from top to bottom (or vice versa), ensuring it makes contact with the substrate. This pushes the ink through the open areas of the stencil.
4. **Lift and Repeat:** Carefully lift the screen to reveal your print. Repeat the flood and print strokes for subsequent prints. For multi-color designs, allow the ink to dry partially or fully between layers before printing the next color.

Step 6: Curing the Ink

This is essential for durability, especially on fabric.

1. **Heat Curing:** Plastisol inks require heat to cure. This can be achieved with a heat gun, a flash cure unit (common in

professional setups), or by ironing the print (on fabric) through a piece of parchment paper. Follow the ink manufacturer's recommended curing temperature and time. Water-based inks often air dry but can also be heat-set for increased durability.
